SOCIO-ECONOMIC AND POLITICAL CONTEXT

1. RESILIENCE AND ECONOMIC TRANSFORMATION IN SUB-SAHARAN AFRICA

Overall Resilient African Economies

- No recession in 2020, rebound in 2021 and 2022 despite the war in Ukraine, consolidation in 2023-24-25
- Inflation rapidly decelerating in the WAEMU
- A monitoring of the debt is required

➔ An economic dynamism in West Africa with a GDP growth forecast of 4.3% for 2025; 6.2% in the WAEMU.

Attractive Coastal Economies

- Port infrastructure open to the world
- Very dynamic economies: Ivory Coast, Senegal, Benin, Ghana
- Nigeria recently joined the BRICS

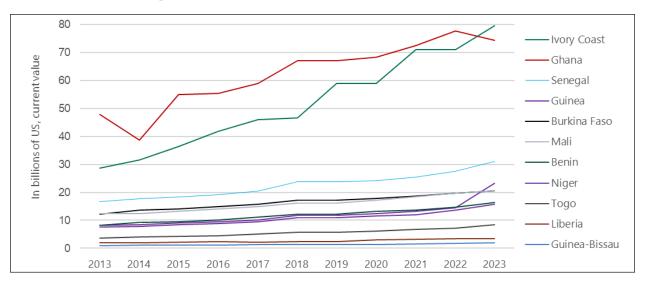
These economies are integrated in global trade and offer genuine investment opportunities, including in tourism, hospitality, and leisure.

Strong Growth Drivers

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- Strong development of infrastructure and structuring projects
- Urbanization and land valuation but high development costs
- Exploitation of resources (extractive industries, carbon credits...) in development
- → Valuation phenomena creating economic opportunities, with a challenge of wealth distribution.

2. DEMOGRAPHIC DYNAMICS IN AFRICA

Strong Population Growth

- World's strongest population growth of nearly 2.5%, particularly driven by rising life expectancy
- Forecast for the continent to increase from 1.5 to 2.5 billion inhabitants by 2050
- → Undeniable demographic power that is rapidly developing, with significant implications in terms of needs and opportunities.

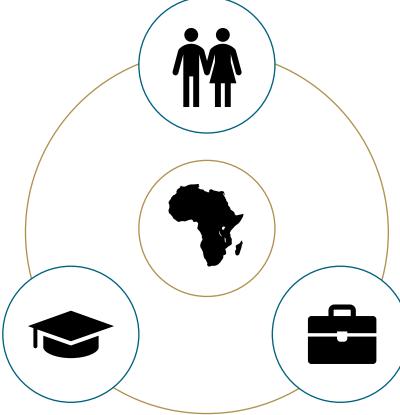
Demographic Transition

- Evolution towards a population structure (fewer children and few seniors) favorable to production, consumption, savings, and investment
- Progressive emergence of the middle classes
- → A growing pool of labor, consumers, but also savers and investors.

Human Capital Challenges

- 70% of the population of West Africa is under the age of 30
- Overall low literacy rates

→ A need for the qualification and training of young people to foster inclusive economic and social growth.





3. GEOPOLITICAL CONTEXT IN SUB-SAHARAN AFRICA

About Anti-Western Rhetoric

- Varied opinions in the field; radical activism is marginal; AES: risks ahead for economic integration and regional cooperation in these states
- Rejection of social and economic domination/ inequality/ marginalization in the international arena, rather than a rejection of Western peoples
- Deep dynamics in relation to the West, with demands to participate in the establishment of new international norms within a shifting international economic and political order
- → Emergence of the Global South, including sub-Saharan Africa, on the international stage.

About Diversifying Partnerships

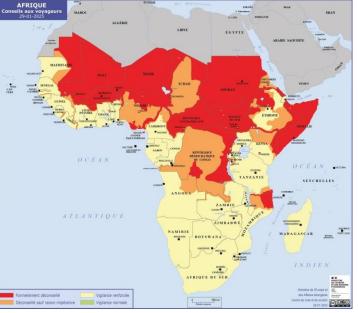
- The involvement of other actors (e.g. China, Turkey, etc.) should be seen as an opportunity
- A system of alliances that is no longer made up of blocs with a leader (e.g. China, Russia, etc.): circumstantial alliances and convergences
- → Each country acts according to its own interests as defined by its elites and opportunities arise based on context.

About Conflicts

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- Behind these conflicts lies a persistent lack of human security, with shared responsibility between continental and external actors
- Collective challenge: establishing a social balance that reduces the likelihood of conflicts, particularly intra-state conflicts
- → Tourism plays a fundamental role: driver of security, economic growth and social dynamism.

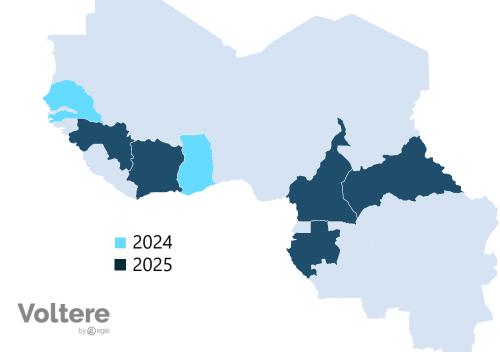

- 2025: presidential elections scheduled in Ivory Coast, Cameroon, Central African Republic, Gabon, and likely in Guinea.
- → Outlook differs from country to country.

→ Development opportunities due to the favourable context and integration with international standards.

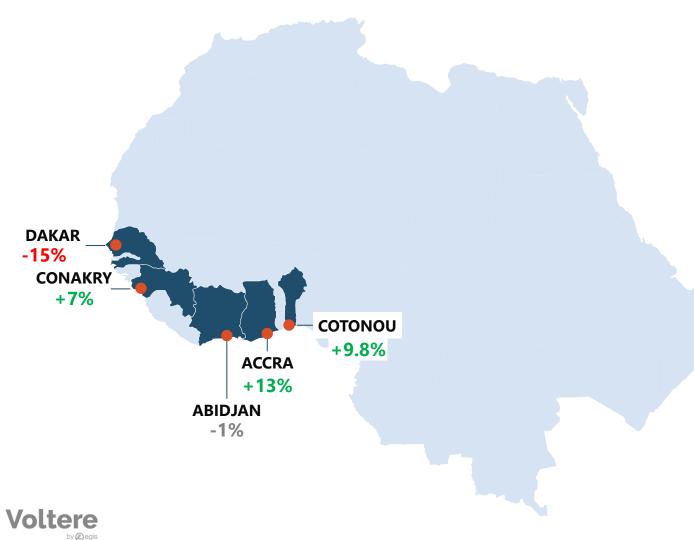

RevPAR Variation 2023 vs. 2024

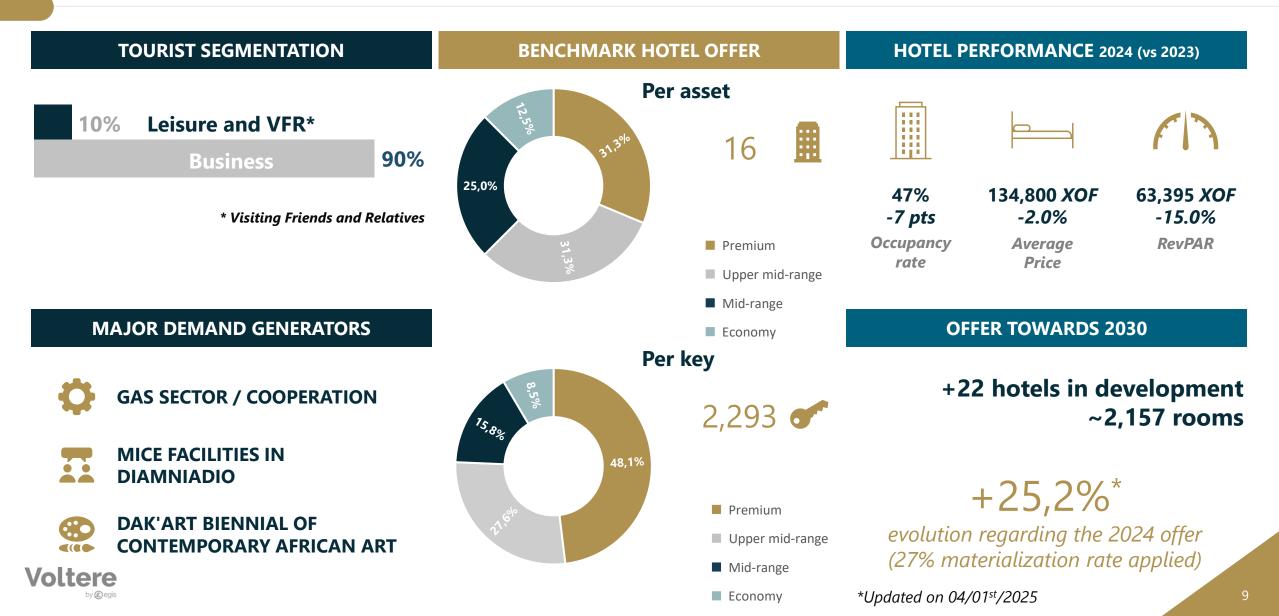

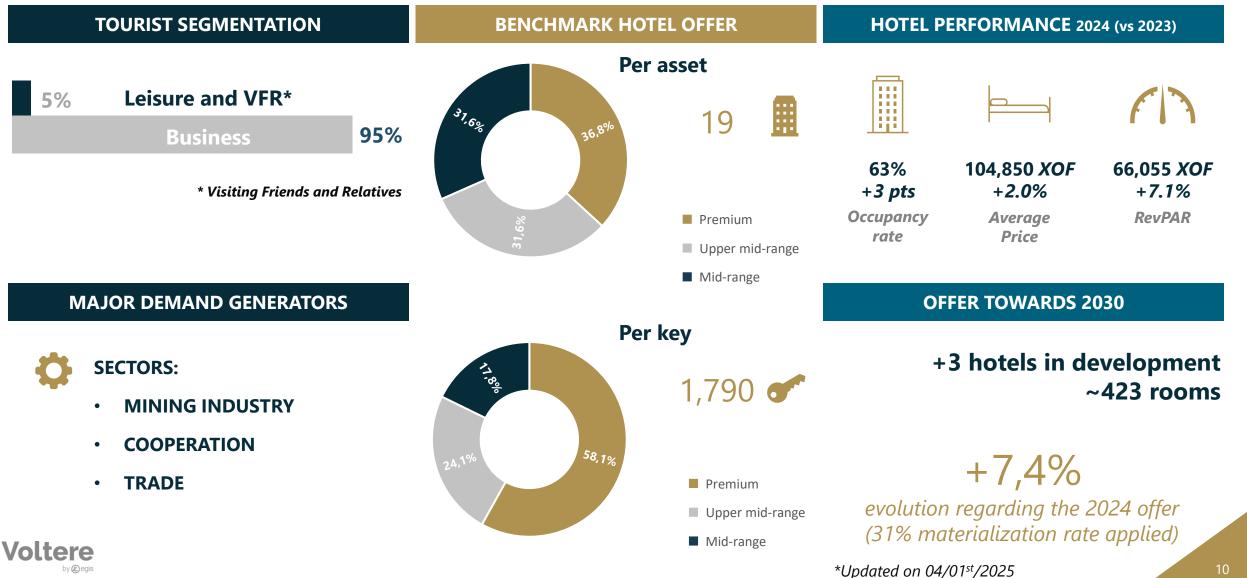

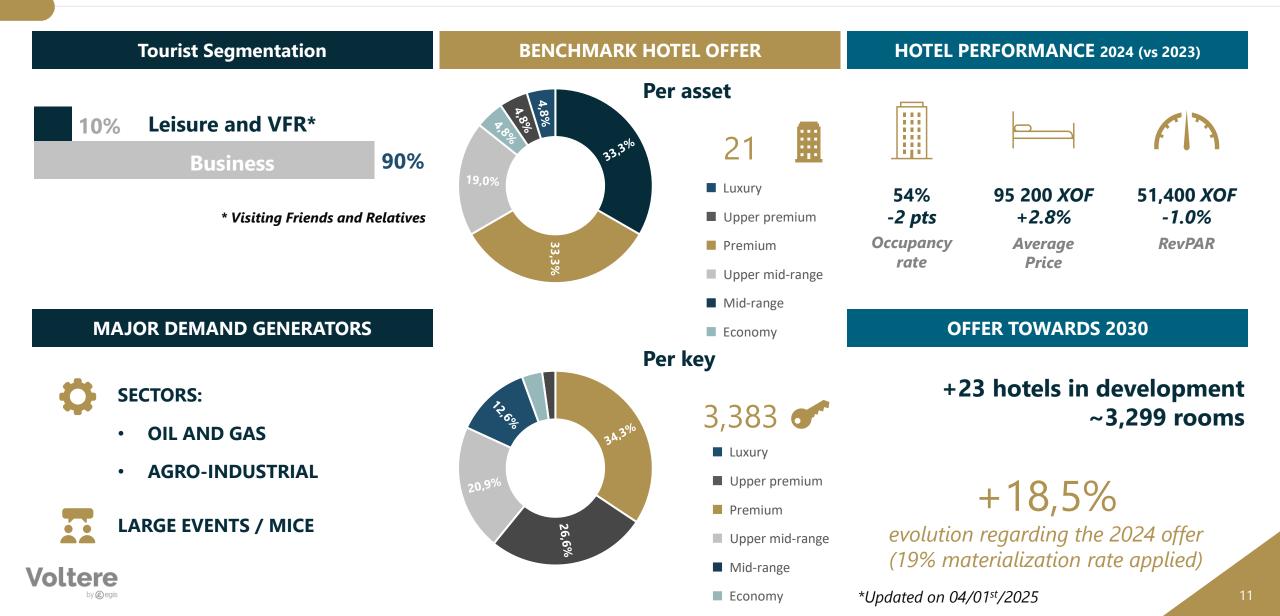

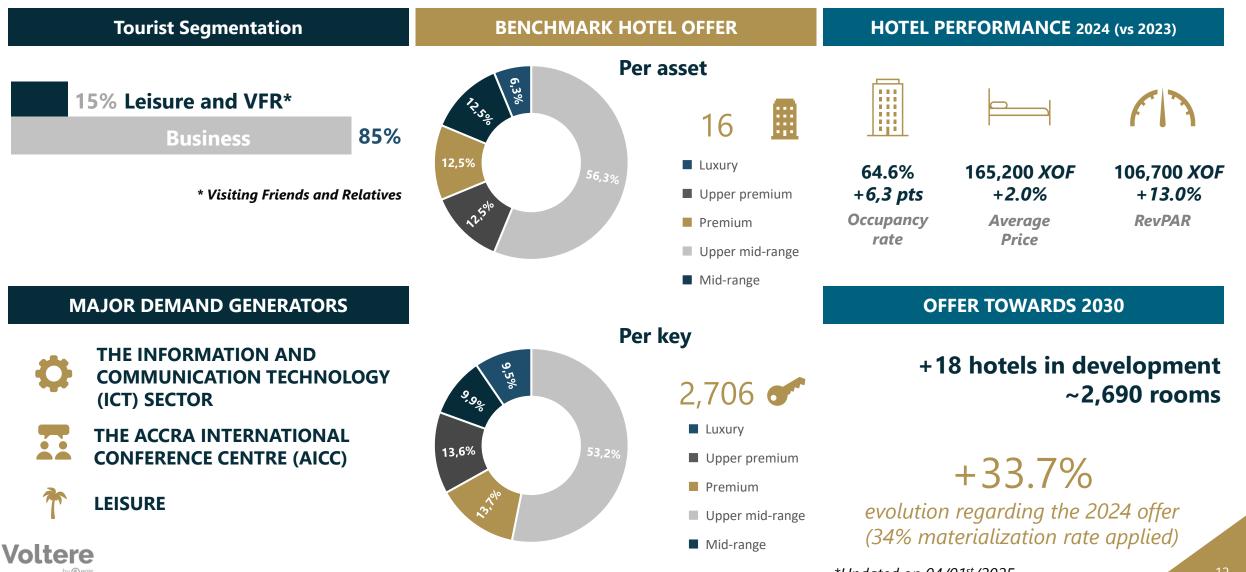

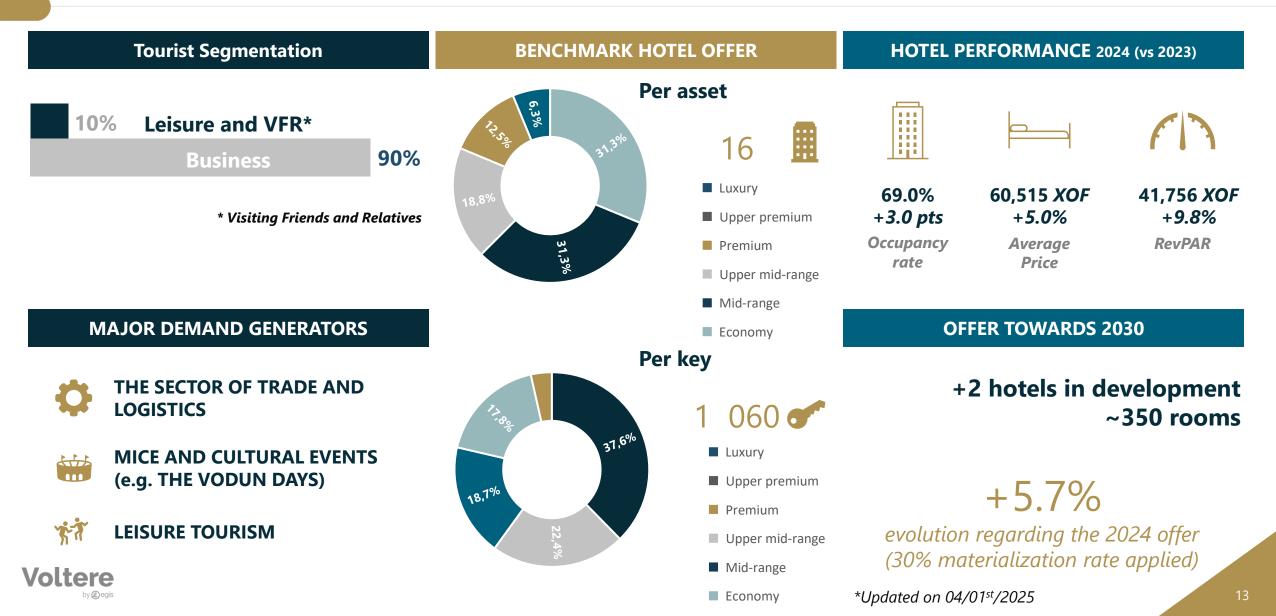

MACRO-CONTEXT

African countries need to assert themselves on the international stage, and tourism has a role to play in terms of soft power

HOSPITALITY

The sub-region's key performance indicators (KPIs) show a generally positive trend

Opportunities for tourism development driven by very dynamic economies and demographics, with challenges in terms of wealth distribution and training

Strong pipeline across all destinations, but needs to be qualified because of low project delivery rate



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
